1,000 PAPER CRANES will be shipped this week to Los Alamos,
New Mexico from Iowa County. The Iowa County Citizens for Peace
knew they would need help when they took up the challenge of sending
1,000 origami cranes to Los Alamos as part of the national effort to fold
70,000 cranes, in commemoration of the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Hiroshima

and Nagasaki atomic bombs. And help they found. Over the past several months, 135 people from Dodgeville, Cobb, Montfort, Highland, Mineral Point, Barneveld and Spring Green met in local libraries, churches and cafes to fold over 1,000 cranes. The citizens group is shipping them to the National Conference on Nonviolence this week.

Los Alamos is the fitting site for the conference. The bombs were developed there decades ago. While learning how to fold the cranes, (not an easy task), the participating children and adults also learned about the symbolism of the paper crane. It began with Sadako Sasaki, who was two years old when the first bomb threw her out of a window at her Hiroshima home. She

was ten when purple spots formed on her arms and legs. Hospitalized for leukemia in Feb 1955, she died in October of that year. In her last months, she folded 1,300 paper cranes as a prayer for healing. The crane is now an international symbol of peace and a poignant reminder of the human costs of nuclear bombs.
