move within 48 hours. You could take only the possessions you could carry & no one would tell you when you would be permitted to return home." That's the harrowing story Christine will reveal about her family members, who were among the 100,000 people of Japanese descent, many of them U.S. citizens, that were forced to leave their West Coast homes. For the duration of World War II, they were imprisoned in distant internment camps. At this event, refreshments provided by the new Mineral Point restaurant, Kusaka, will be served.
