Justice Patience Roggensack, a conservative, is running for a second term. Her challengers are Marquette University law professor Ed Fallone and lemon law attorney Vince Megna. You could take only the possessions you could carry and no one would tell you when you would be permitted to return home." That's the harrowing story Christine will reveal about her family members, who were among the 100,000 people of Japanese descent, many of them U.S. citizens that were forced to leave their West Coast homes. For the duration of World War II, they were imprisoned in distant internment camps. At this event, refreshments provided by the new Mineral Point restaurant, Kusaka, will be served.

Here's a health care reform update from Grassroots' partner Citizen Action of

<u>Wisconsin.</u> The Federal Government has offered Wisconsin billions of dollars to fill gaps in BadgerCare coverage, but apparently Gov. Walker will be turning it down. Currently, holes exist in BadgerCare eligibility that would be filled by the federal funding, giving an additional 175,000 Wisconsinites access to affordable health coverage. Gov. Walker claims the state could be left holding the bag if the Federal Government reneged on its funding. But the ObamaCare law has already appropriated the funds and according to the <u>Associated Press</u>, any change in the law is extremely unlikely. The nonpartisan Legislative Fiscal Bureau said that accepting the federal funds would save the state \$65 million in BadgerCare costs. DO YOU CARE ABOUT THIS ISSUE? Then click here to email <u>Gov.
