Everyone who participates will be building bridges of understanding between our corner of America and the remote areas of Afghanistan and Pakistan (the setting for the book) where so many of our young men and women have served in the military. Such an understanding may be our last, best hope for a lasting peace. HERE'S HOW YOU CAN GET INVOLVED. Attend the <u>Stones into Schools</u> kick-off event on Thursday, October 28 at 7 p.m. at the Dodgeville Library. You'll see a short film about the inspiring work of <u>Stones into Schools</u> author Greg Mortenson who has built over 140 schools in Afghanistan and Pakistan.
