HOW IS CLIMATE CHANGE POLLING? "The perception among

many in the media, in politics, and so on—that you can't talk about climate change because half the country is against you—it's false, it's wrong," According to Yale researcher Anthony Leiserowitz, true climate change skeptics make up only

15 percent of adults. "They're a really loud 15 percent, and they have convinced much of the country it's not safe to talk about it, but it's just not true." His certainty comes from a decade's worth of polling that reveals a far more nuanced picture of American attitudes toward climate change than previously thought—or even widely held now, for that matter.
